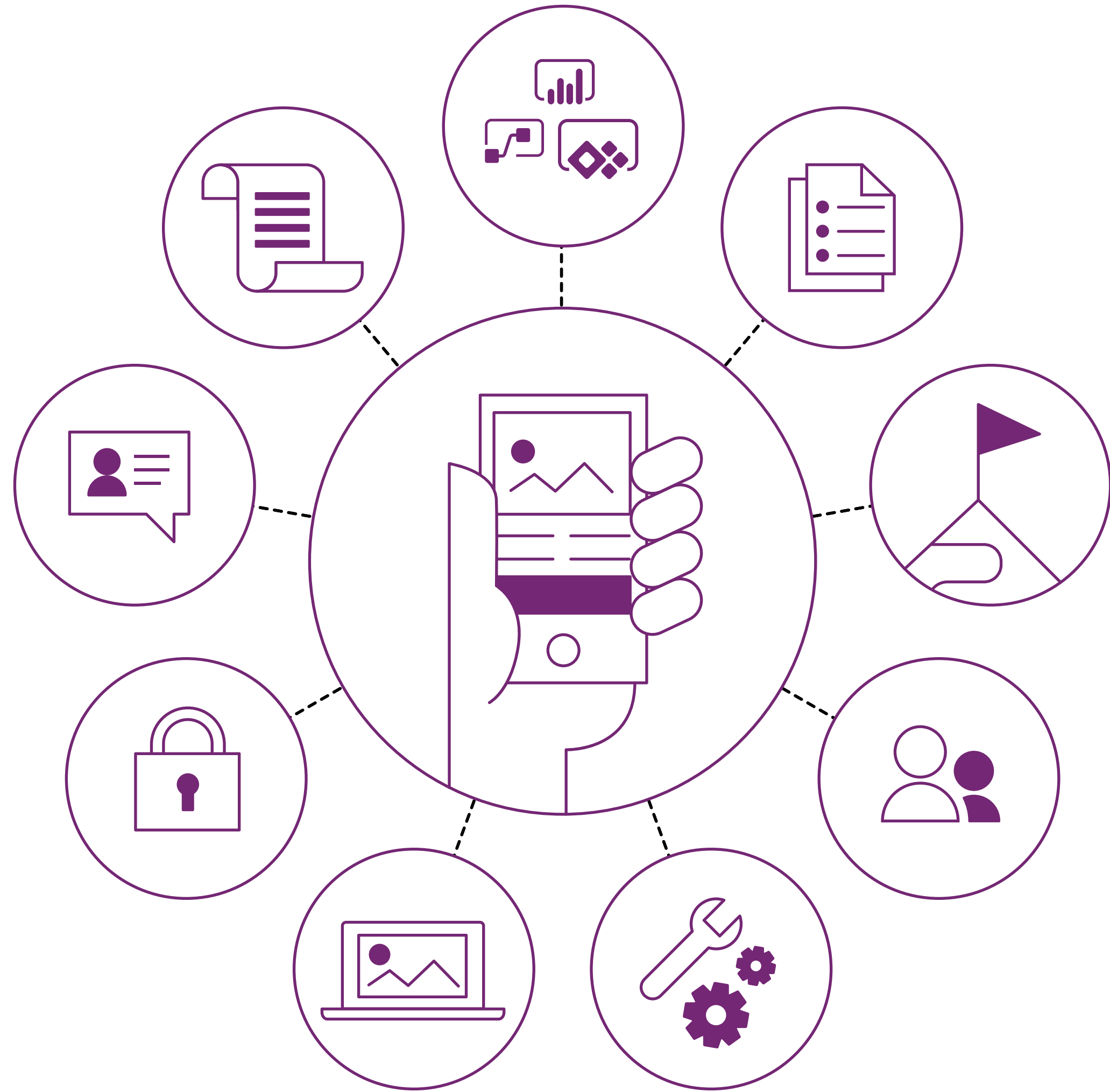
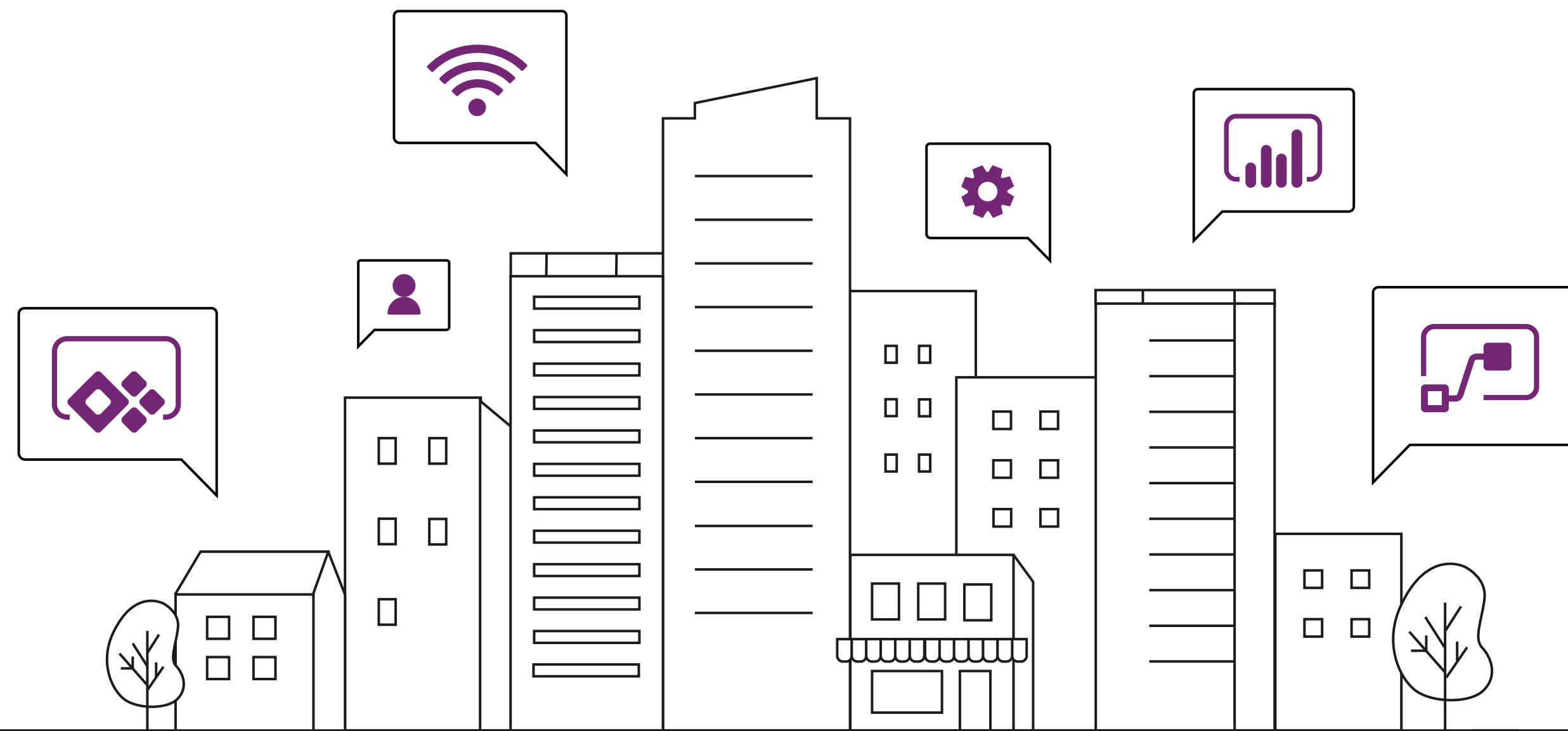


9 Pro Tips to Get Started with Low-Code App Development

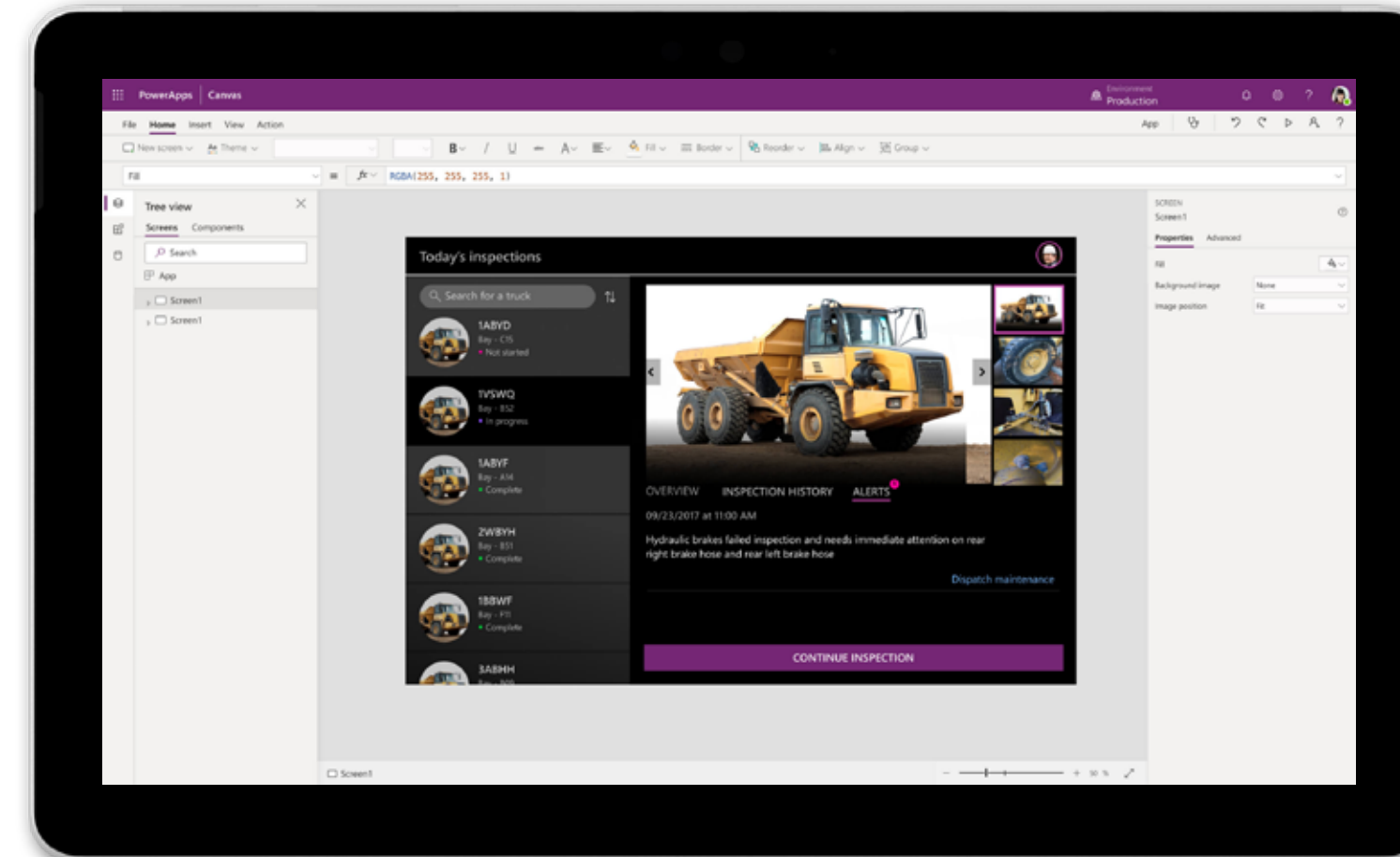
Tip 1

Get to know the tools of the trade

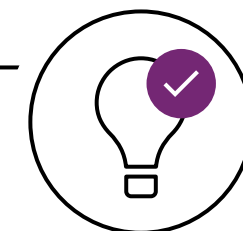

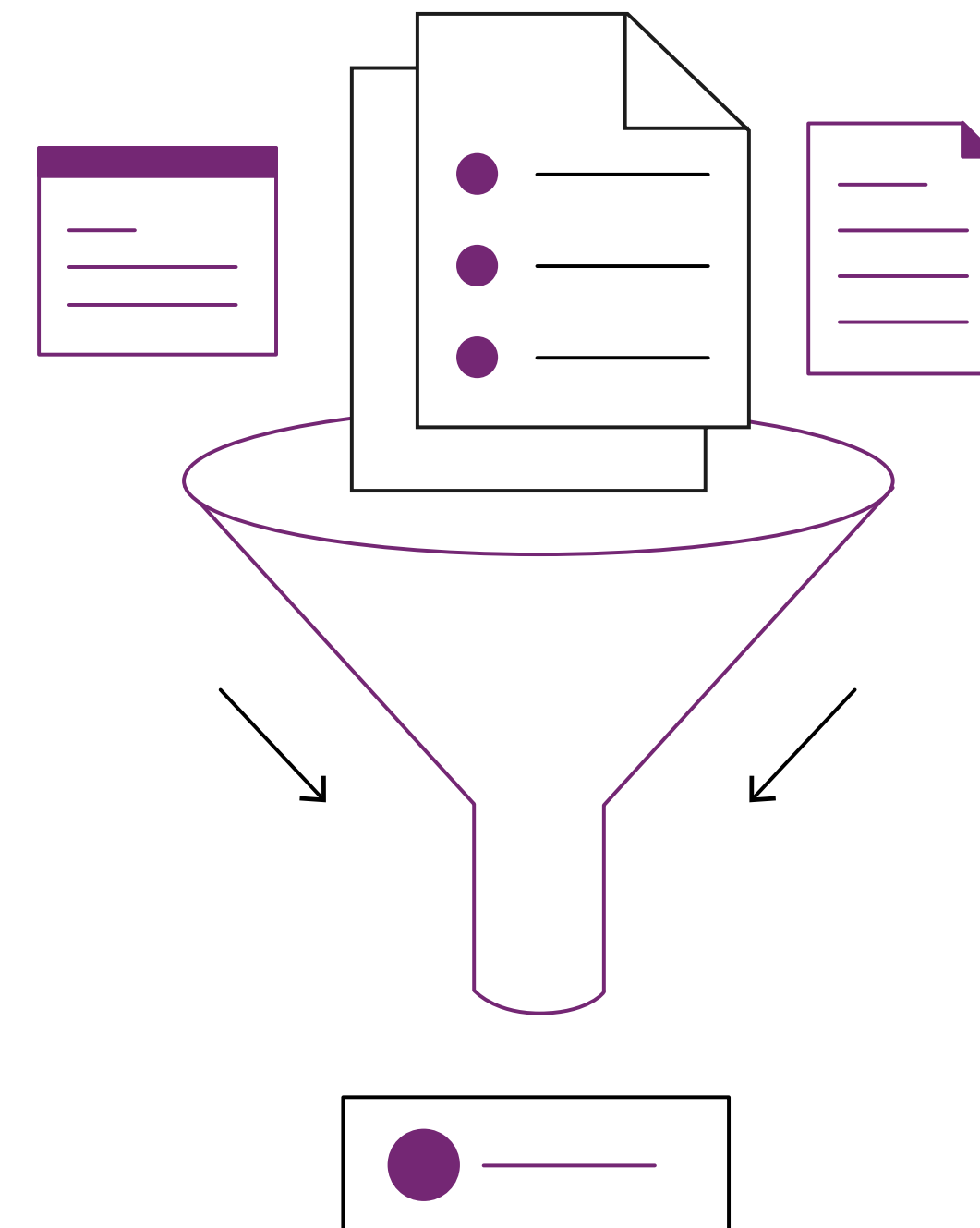
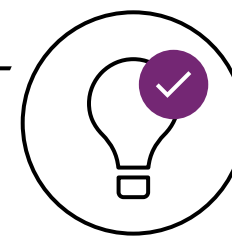
Tip 2

Small is beautiful

When building your first app, smaller is better. Choose a well-defined task for your app to perform and get clear on what success looks like. Creating a solution is a lot easier when you have a clear idea of what the problem is. This will allow you to dive in and start exploring while staying focused. For example, an app that displays information from a spreadsheet or a SharePoint list is easy to build and customize.

Tip 3

Know your audience

Understanding the problem you're going to solve and the data you're going to use are important first steps to creating a great app. The final piece of the puzzle is knowing who is going to use your app and how. By starting with a challenge that you've experienced yourself, this process is made much simpler.

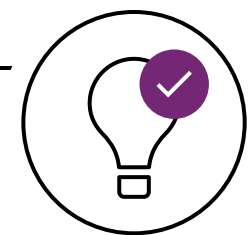
If you and your team will be the users, it's easy to figure out whether you're more likely to access the application through a mobile phone or a tablet, for example. Choices like these will influence how you build your app.

If you are not the target audience for your application, take some time to understand the needs of those who are. What devices do they use? What's their day like? What value will your solution provide? Putting yourself in their shoes will help your app be more successful.

Power Apps can be [made responsive](#), or you can publish them for specific screen layouts such as a phone, tablet, or browser. It's helpful to decide which types of devices will access your app before you start creating.



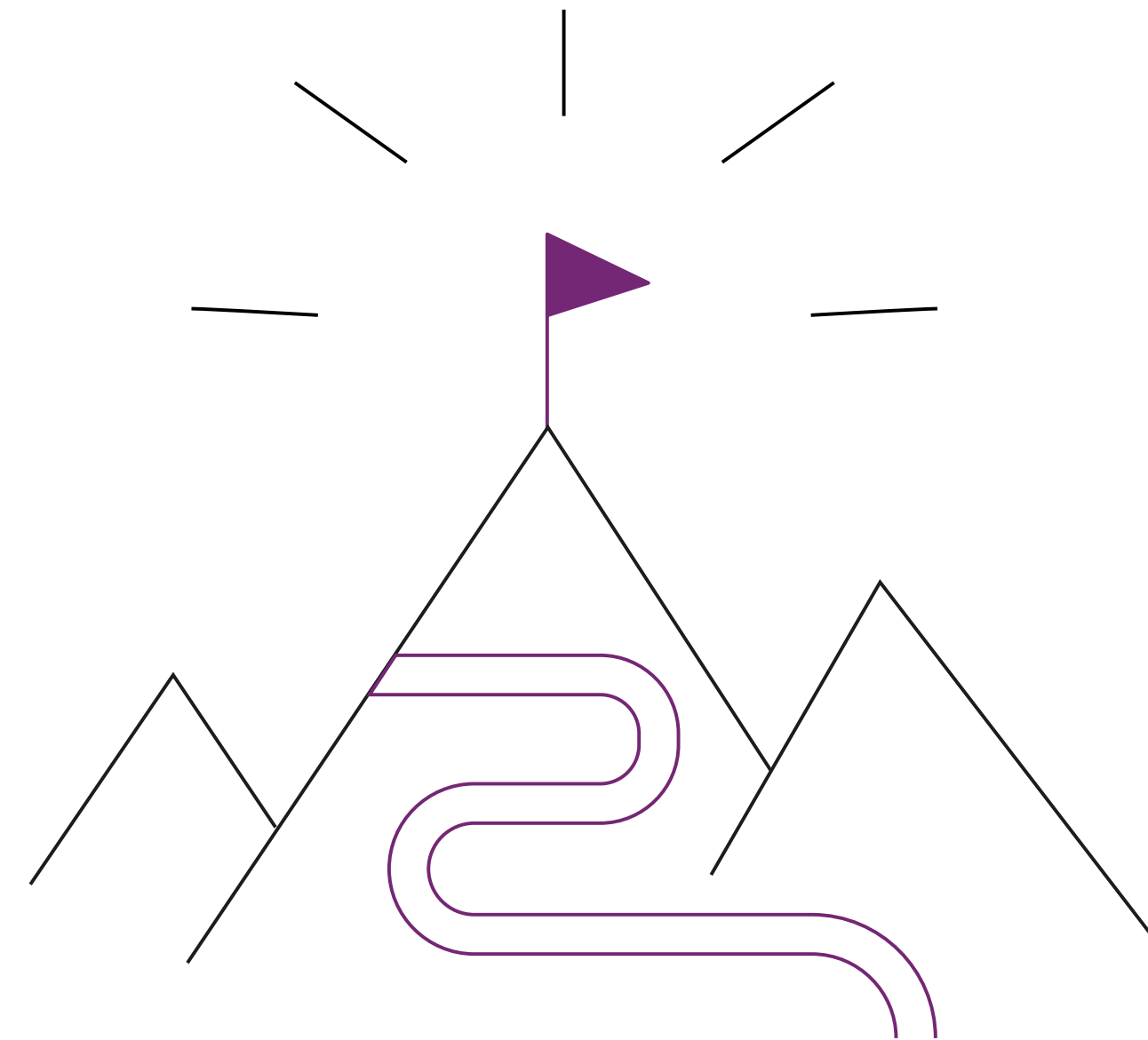
Tip 4

Take a well-marked path

Familiarizing yourself with the fundamentals will help you get off to a great start. Microsoft has created clearly defined learning paths for Power Apps that start with the simplest concepts and work up to more advanced capabilities.

The best place to start is with the learning path called "[Create a Canvas App in Power Apps](#)." It will guide you from Power Apps fundamentals through creating and customizing a sample app in just a couple of hours.

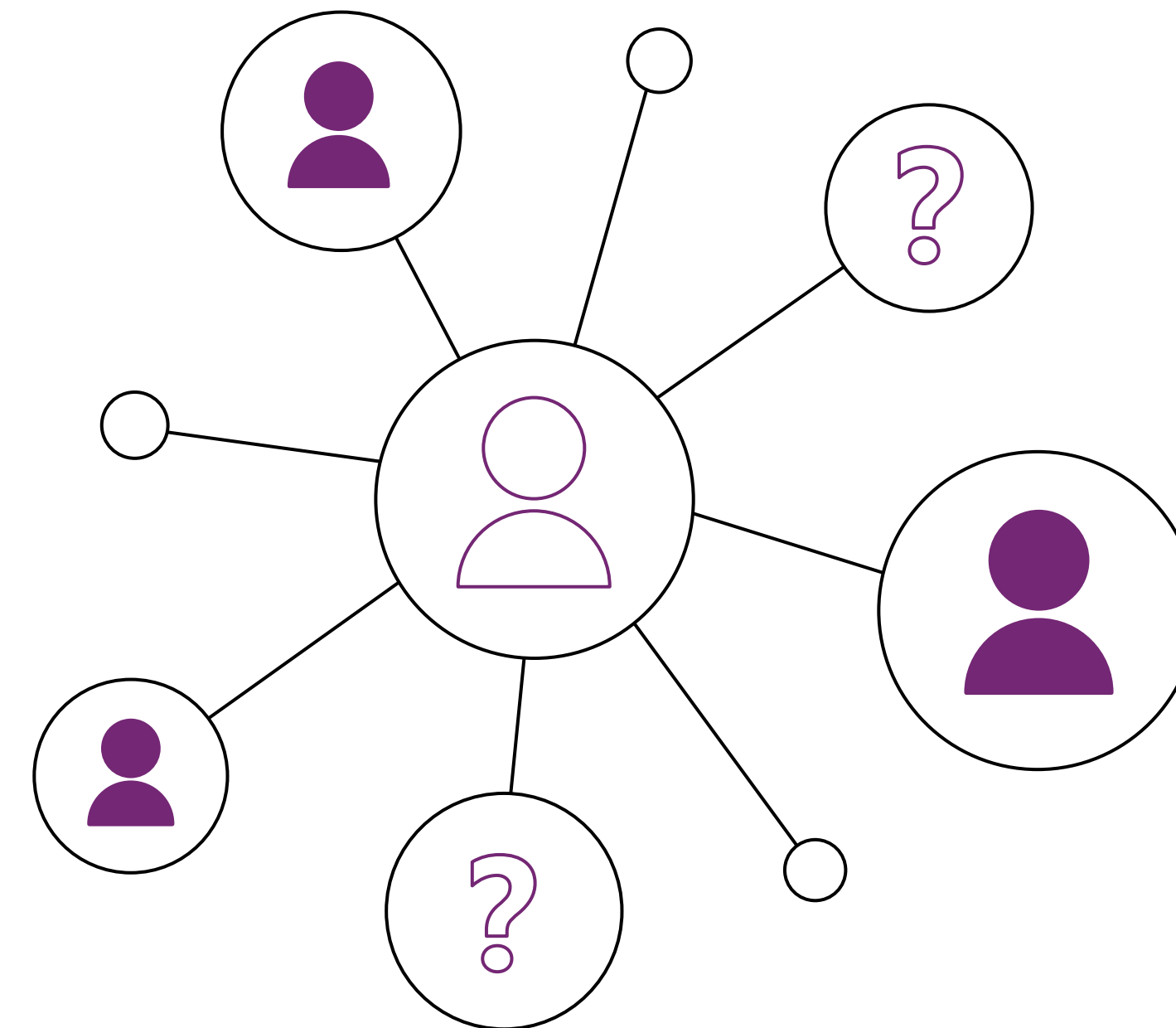
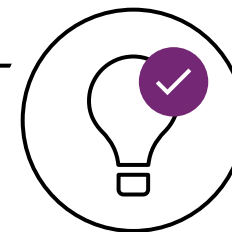
Tip 5

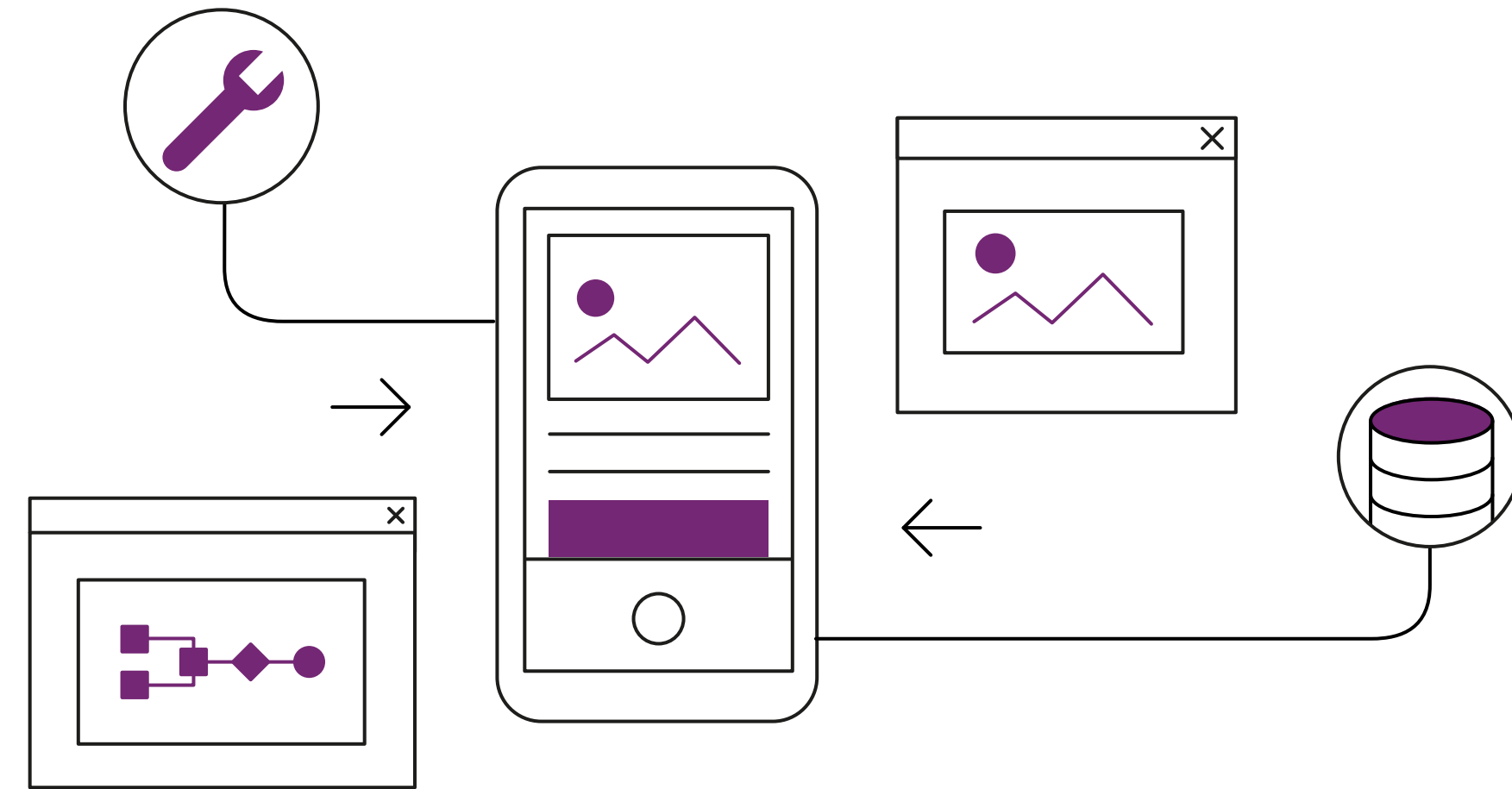
Use what you've got

Power Apps is designed to work seamlessly with Office 365, Dynamics 365, and many external apps and data sources. When you're first starting out, it pays to build your solution based on something you know well.

Starting with Office 365

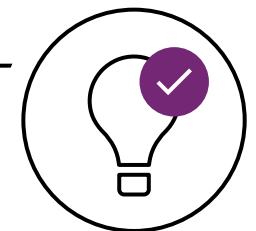
An Excel spreadsheet stored in One Drive for Business makes a great basis for a Power App. [This tutorial](#) shows how you can very quickly generate an app from an Excel spreadsheet and then customize it to your needs. You can do the same thing [using a SharePoint list](#). Once your app is published, you can [embed it in Microsoft Teams](#) to drive usage and adoption.

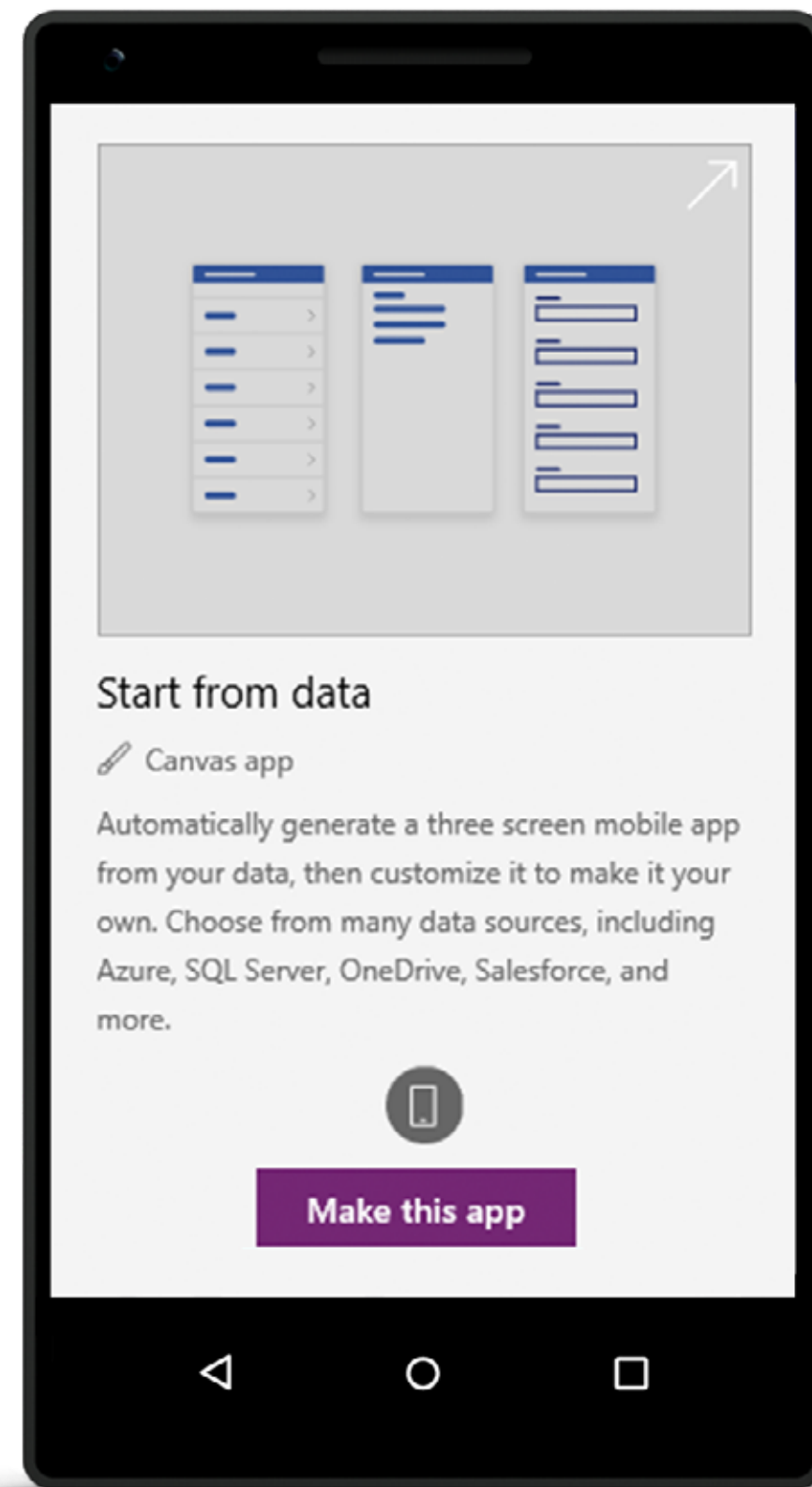
Or, let's say you're a salesperson who works with Dynamics 365 CRM. From the Power Apps menu, you can [automatically generate a new app](#) that uses your Dynamics 365 data in just a few clicks. By starting with data that's familiar, you'll get to a working app faster.



Power tip

Your Microsoft Office 365 skills will come in handy when building on Power Apps. The design interface is like PowerPoint, using a drag-and-drop approach to build the user experience. Plus, adding functionality to your app uses formulas like those in Excel.





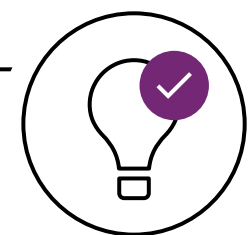
It's easy to create an app from an Excel spreadsheet.

Starting with an external solution

Power Apps uses prebuilt connectors to access a wide range of popular applications, platforms, and data sources. For example, you could [connect an app to Twitter](#) and tweet, search Twitter, and trigger tweet-based workflows from within your app. There are a few more steps involved, but connectors make it much easier.

Power Apps features connectors to more than 250 common applications and platforms, from Salesforce to Slack. [Check out](#) some of your options.



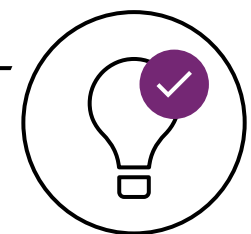
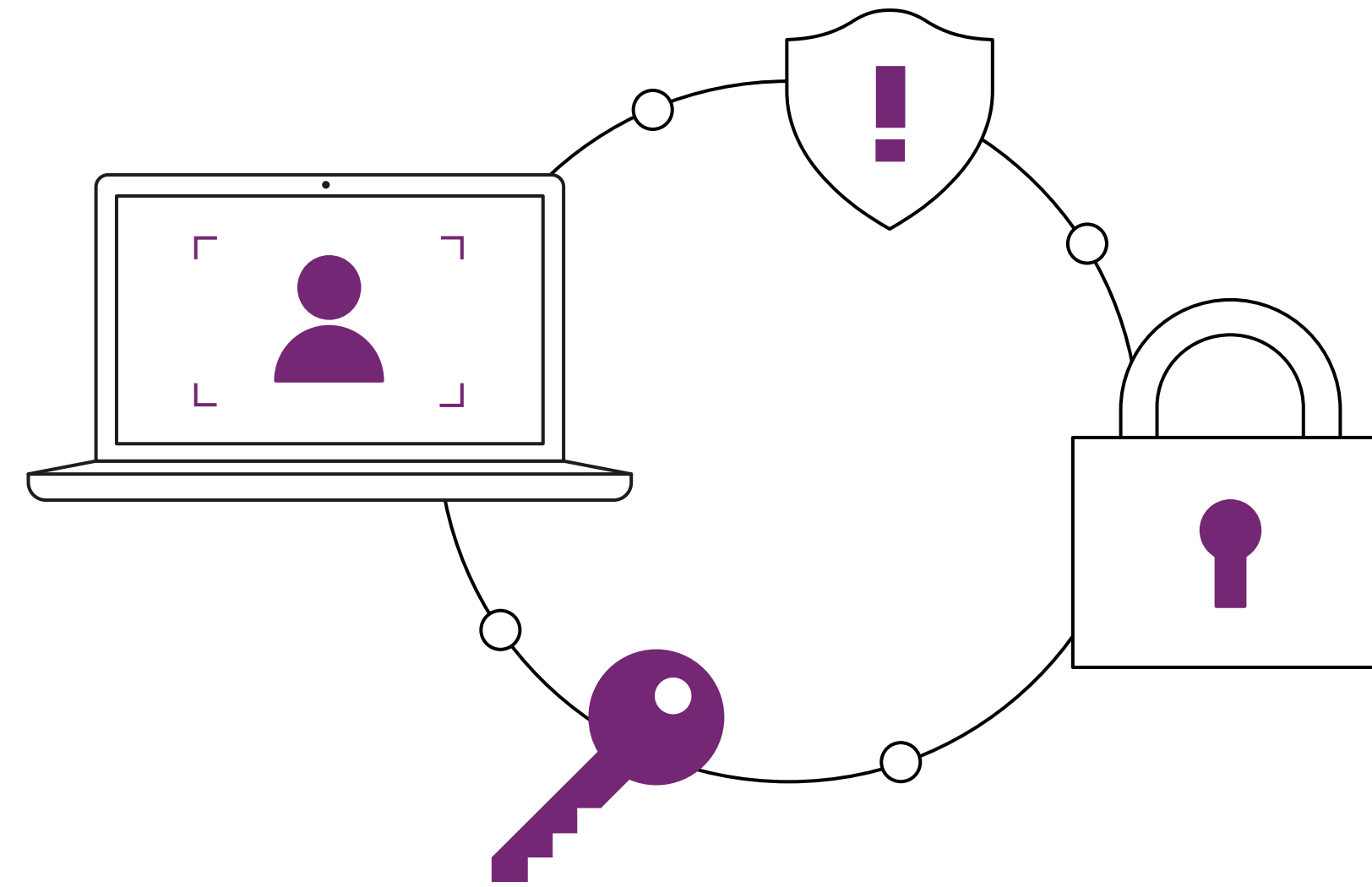
Tip 7

Keep data privacy top of mind

When you use Power Apps, you're building on a highly secure and governed platform created by Microsoft. It is designed for enterprise use, with built-in controls governing data access, security, and compliance. Microsoft is a trusted partner to IT departments.

Nevertheless, it's important to consider whether any of the data captured or displayed by your app could be considered sensitive or proprietary and to take appropriate precautions. Talk to your IT department if you need help navigating this aspect of your application.

The Power Apps [governance documentation](#) is a good page to share with any IT professionals who have questions or concerns. It shows how the platform supports enterprise-grade security and control.

Starting your journey as a citizen developer with low-risk data can help you demonstrate the value of low-code development inside your organization while alleviating concerns around data privacy.

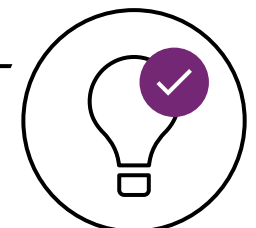

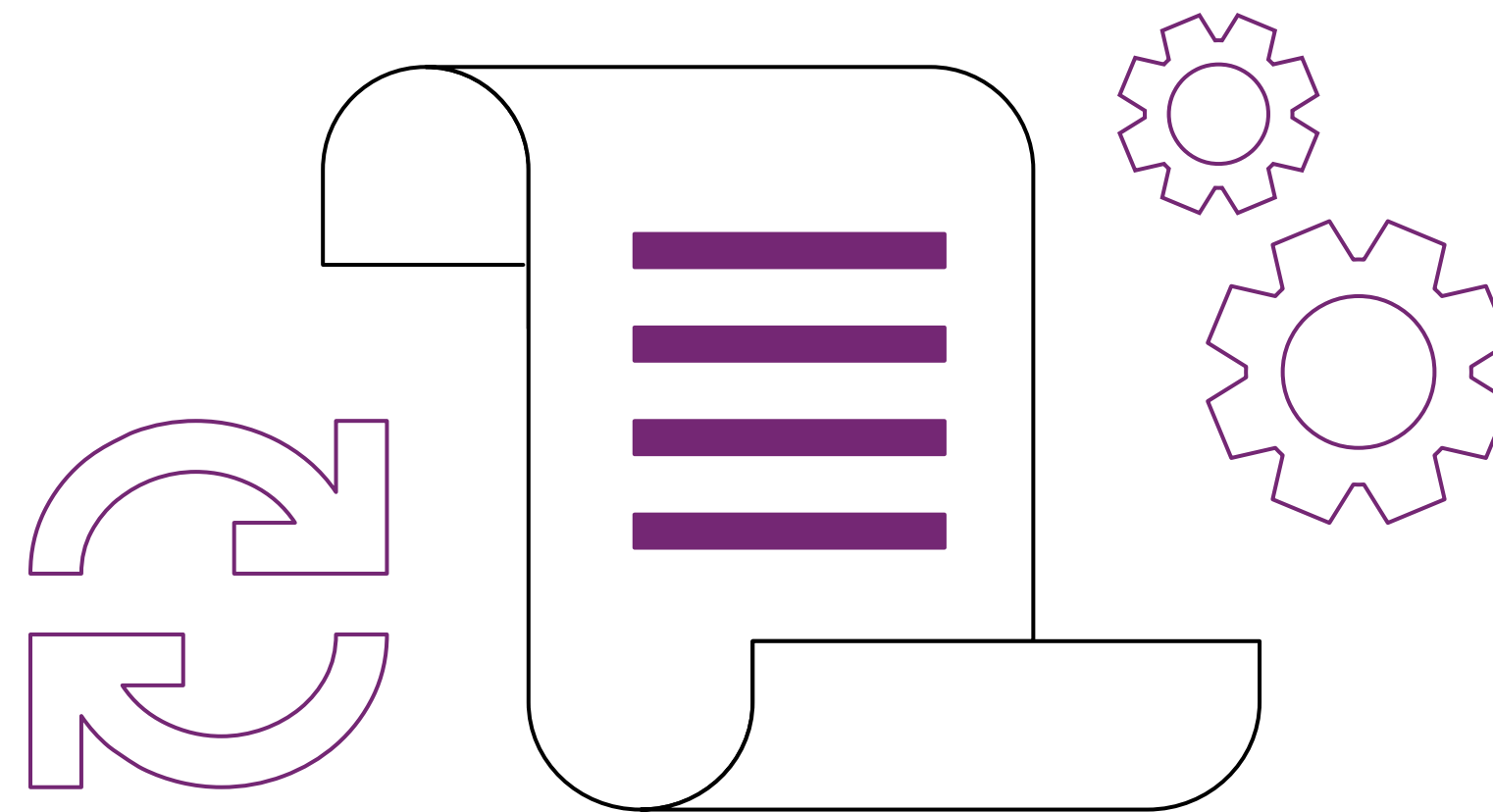
